## End-to-end encryption for all – Zoom

After the debacle of Zoom, the video communications app provider decided it will only offer end-to-end encryption (E2EE) for its paid customers. Just after weeks of this decision from the feedback received from civil liberties organizations, CISO council, child safety advocates, encryption experts, government representatives and user the CEO of Zoom announced that have decided to provide E2EE for all its users.

The enhanced E2EE will be available starting in July 2020.



## NHS contact tracing with new framework

The UK Government after weeks of launching NHS Test and Trace the contact tracing app has now announced next phase of the app and will adopt Google/ Apple framework. This move comes amid technical issues and criticism faced over privacy concerns.



## Dutch DPA on use facial recognition

Autoriteit Persoonsgegevens (AP), the Dutch Data Protection Authority has informed the supermarkets on use of facial recognition.

AP has issued a letter to the Central Food Trade Agency, the trade association to prevent supermarkets from unlawfully using facial recognition.

## Highest ever fine under GDPR

CNIL, the French Data Protection Authority last year imposed a fine of EUR 50 million (USD 56 million) on Google for violating the GDPR obligations of transparency and legal basis for processing.

The fine was highest ever and appeal was filed with the Apex administrative Court of France. On 19<sup>th</sup> June, 2020 the Court seized the appeal and confirmed that the fine imposed was not disproportionate.



# Finnish watchdog fines Taxi Operator

The Office of the Data Protection Ombudsman, the Finnish Data Protection Authority imposed a fine of EUR 72,000 on Taksi Helsinki, a Finland based taxi operator for violation of GDPR.

The company failed to assess the compliance of GDPR before upgrading to a camera surveillance system that records audio and video in its taxis; and also the company did not notify the customers of such change and the documentation of personal data processing.
